Prepare the Way - For the Light is Coming!

Greeting folks! It is so great to be back with you again. If you have not noticed - it is December already - where has the year gone! So, before we talk Christmas and all that it brings, I want to remind us again that it is the second week of our journey in the season of Advent – a season of waiting, hoping, expecting of the coming of the Light of the World.

Advent means "coming." Something's or Someone's coming - and it's not just Santa. The light of the world is coming. It's just around the corner, close by, on the horizon - you only have to reach out a bit, and you can touch it - that's the message. But Advent isn't just about what and who is coming to us. It's also about the journey we are taking, the journey that leads us to our true home, that place of welcome we long for, being guided by the light of the world.



Just as Mary and Joseph travel to Bethlehem, the shepherds to the manger crib, the wise men from their distant lands, we are called to be on the move towards the light this Advent. It is a journey of coming home to the God who loves us and helping others to come home to the place of joy and peace and love. A welcoming place to be with God. We do that through prayer and reflection and we also do it as we give to those in need through the Christmas Bowl appeal amongst others and as we campaign for justice and peace in a world that doesn't believe in Christmas anymore. A world made so alien and different because of Covid 19.

As we begin to enjoy a sense of relief and freedom from the long shadow of COVID, the new Omicron variant of the virus has dampened our spirit. If you are reading this with any degree of pessimism and feeling tired already about how this new variant might impact our newfound freedom, longing for a clearer and smoother path and a way forward perhaps, our Gospel reading from Luke for this week may just be what you need as encouragement. This week's Gospel story begins in a geographically low place: the wilderness region around the River Jordan. Jesus' ministry begins in this low place (though that is in the next part of Luke chapter 3). Jesus' ministry also began in a socially low place – not in some highly magnificent palace, suitable for one born to be king or in a grand temple, a home suitable perhaps for the Son of God. It began in a stable.

The wilderness and a stable – how different to the ways of the world: where status is so important, where the place you went to school, or university – if you went to university – is considered so important by some; where wanting to become a celebrity is the life goal of significant numbers of people. Society looks at these things and says: the grander, the higher, the better! And if you don't have, or can't achieve these things, you lose out. But John, and Jesus, say 'No.' That is not the way. The way – the way of the Lord – takes a different path. The way of the Lord – straight, level and smooth – has no obstacles in the way, no hurdles that must be overcome; no 'grander, higher, better to keep people out.

To those who would travel this way, the message couldn't be plainer: repent and be baptized by water and the Holy Spirit and follow Jesus. To those who have already taken this step: we know that what sounds simple is, in fact, a lifelong process of becoming more Christ-like, or – to use Malachi's words – of purifying experiences. But the challenge of today's Bible readings is that we must do nothing – nothing at all – that might obscure the message that Jesus is for all, or that makes the way of the Lord anything other than straight, level and smooth for those who want to travel it with us.

Christmas Cards

Since Victorian times it has been a custom to send Christmas cards, conveying our personal greetings to friends and family, especially to those who live some distance away. For many, this may be the only opportunity in the year to keep connected with those whose paths crossed ours at an earlier time of our lives. As you write your Christmas cards and greetings (or send them electronically) this year, take time to reflect on how your list of recipients reflects the story of your life, and the places and situations you have been a part of.

Who are the people you value in this way? How do they fit into the story of your life?

Is there any significance in how or when these people became involved in your life? Acknowledge, too, if this brings to mind the sadness of losses. As a family or church group, can you share the story of your connections to some of the more far-flung recipients or those who have been part of your life for the longest?

As we ponder the coming of Christ, can you think of ways to extend your connections into new places? Is social media able to help us to spread positive messages to a wider audience? Could you send cards or messages to victims of injustice supported by Amnesty International, to refugees far from home, or to fellow Christians elsewhere in the world through a church twinning scheme?

God of the journey, we thank you for the network of relationships we treasure at this time of year. Give us hearts to send your love ever wider into the world, taking our small part in helping 'all people to see the salvation of God'. Amen.

A personal prayer

Eternal God, you called John when he was in the wilderness, to prepare the way for your Son. Speak to me in my wildernesses of tiredness, anxiety and longing, and prepare a way in my heart, that I may receive the forgiveness, the healing, and the peace that your Son delights to give. Amen.

Live your faith

Listen out for the voices of people on the margins of our society. Are they calling for the values of the kingdom of God? How can you add your voice to theirs?

Questions for reflection

- How does this labyrinth draw you in?
- Where are you on this journey?
- Does the light of God guide you?

Uplifting Messages










iberius was Emperor of Rome. Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea. Herod was ruler of Galilee and Philip and Lysanias were the other local rulers. Annas and Caiaphas were the high priests. These were the powerful people when the word of God came to John, son of Zechariah. John went through the whole district around the river Jordan, teaching people that they must repent and turn away from sin, and be baptized, as a sign of a new way of life with God.

The prophet Isaiah had described it like this when he said: 'A voice will cry out in the wilderness: "Prepare a way for the Lord! Make his paths straight. All the valleys will be filled in, and the mountains lowered down to make the road smooth and straight. Then everyone will see how God will save us."'

Did you know?

- Repent means saying sorry to God for what you have done; having a change of heart.
- A prophet is someone who wrote down messages from God, a long time ago, about the promised Messiah.



The great leveller



Luke 3.1-6

John the Baptist, Jesus' cousin, preaches the word of God in the land surrounding the river Jordan. John preaches a baptism for changed hearts and lives, in order to make way for Jesus and fulfil the prophecy as spoken by the prophet Isaiah, 'prepare the way of the Lord'. Isaiah shows that Jesus' message is one of equality - not just for certain people.

Now read Luke 3.1-6 see p.2 for text.

A note on the passage

As John prepares the hearts and lives of the crowds around him for Jesus' coming, we are also in a time of preparation for Christmas. This time of Advent is of course about preparing for the festivities, but this passage reminds us it is also about preparing for the true meaning of Christmas, and the message of love and hope and equality which Jesus brings. How can you bring that meaning into your preparations?



John tells us that Jesus is to be the great leveller, meaning Jesus will bring equality. If you are buying or making Christmas gifts this week, could you also buy for someone less fortunate then yourself? Try and buy an extra toy or create a box of goodies for a local children's charity, so that we too can become levellers in our communities this Christmas.



Create a Christingle using a large orange to represent the world, a red ribbon tied around it to show Jesus' love poured out, sweets on four cocktail sticks as the four corners of the world, and a candle in the centre of the orange, to symbolise Jesus as the light of the world. Put equal amounts of sweets on the sticks, to show how Jesus came to bring equality for all. Light the candle, and pray for any areas of the world which are in need of Jesus' love and light this Christmas.



Ask yourself: How might this image help us explore 'Jesus is for all'?



Create your own Christmas cards this year. Include within them your favourite Bible verse or an encouraging message from Scripture, to tell others about Jesus the great leveller and all he has done for you.



How often do we find silence and calm in the month of December? Does it feel like the busiest month to you? Can it sometimes feel like we are too busy to spend time with God? Try to be still and spend some time in silent prayer. Light a tall candle, and watch and wait as it begins to melt. Do this every night during Advent as we await Jesus' birth. How do you think Mary felt that first Christmas, waiting for Jesus? How do you think John felt, waiting for Jesus?

In our passage this week, we hear about the wilderness where John is preaching. Wrap up warm and take a walk in your local area. You could create a nature tick list, checking off things from the passage which you experience along the way, such as a path and/or valley, and when you are treading on rough or smooth ground. As you walk, take time to consider some paths in your life: What do they look like? Are there ups and downs/rough and smooth?
